I would like to introduce you to one of the most caring, good-hearted individuals I have met. Ray is a Quad-Cities native. His story begins much like the rest of us, but how he responded to his challenge is what, in my view, sets him apart.

On August 30, 2016, the tri-plex Ray was living in was sold. Ray's name was already on the waiting list for low income housing, but no apartments were available. He was able to stay with a cousin for a couple of weeks, but that was only a short-term solution. He came to Christian Care seeking shelter and was accepted for admission.

Ray's parents were both deceased. Like many families with jobs, children and otherwise busy schedules, Ray's family members were no different. Ray was on his own. With an income of just above minimum wage, Ray had no means to support himself; thus, the application for low income housing. More bad news followed shortly afterward when Ray's employer had to let him go because of lack of business.

Ray accepted the "cards dealt to him." He was not about to let negativity control him. He took the good with the bad and knew that things could have been worse. "I could have been out on the street." Ray stated that he was very grateful to Christian Care for taking him in when he needed it most.

Ray's immediate goals were to find employment and move into an apartment. He remained focused and positive about his future. Today, Ray's goals have been met. Ray is gainfully employed and he settled into his own place in July. We want to take this opportunity to wish him well and good luck. Thank you, Ray, for having a good attitude and for being a positive influence on Christian Care.

For over 100 years, Christian Care has helped transform the lives of many homeless individuals like Ray. We continue to remain true to our mission: "By providing safe shelter, support and resources, Christian Care empowers the homeless to make positive changes in every aspect of their lives."
